Art 23: Survey of World Art

This assignment demonstrates that all the questions in circulation in y ku'õy qtrf 'ctvö'eqwtug are very much present in our American context, that various forms of racism underly most collection practices in museums of natural history until very recently, that there are many justifications for resistance to addressing these racist practices, and that even for best intentioned, straightforward ways of repairing the harm can be amazingly challenging.
